You must break the <u>underlined</u> words below up into their components and define the meaning of each part. Then, using your breakdown of the word and the context that the sentence provides, take a guess at what you think this word actually means.

1. Example Sentence: Julius is constantly thinking about the meaning of life and purpose of existence; he should study ontology.

Component(s) and meaning(s): ont-, being and -logy, study of.

What you think it means as a whole: Study of being or existence.

2. Example Sentence: My friend Marcus is such a <u>ailurophobe</u> that he won't even pet a kitten! Component(s) and meaning(s): ailruo-, cat and phobe, person with a phobia

What you think it means as a whole: Irrational fear of cats

3. Example Sentence: Because I often display my knowledge of Greek and Latin roots at my many dinner parties, people sometimes call me a genius.

Component(s) and meaning(s): ingenium, inner talent

What you think it means as a whole: Especially talented individual.

4. Example Sentence: In the ancient world, <u>philosophy</u> was not just concerned with esoteric theories but also real-world problems.

Component(s) and meaning(s): Phil-, love and soph, wisdom

What you think it means as a whole: The love of wisdom

5. Example Sentence: New students often need an advisor to help them <u>navigate</u> the complicated UW credit system.

Component(s) and meaning(s): navis, ship

What you think it means as a whole: To steer or direct.

6. Example Sentence: In times of economic hardship, politicians often promote fiscal responsibility.

Component(s) and meaning(s): fiscus, purse

What you think it means as a whole: Having to do with money

7. Example Sentence: Sometimes Marcus and Julius play on the Classics intramural soccer team for a little friendly competition.

Component(s) and meaning(s): com-, together and pet-, seek, strive, struggle

What you think it means as a whole: To strive with/against

8. Example Sentence: The Romans did not understand <u>inflation</u> very well and consequently faced severely devalued currency.

 $Component(s) \ and \ meaning(s): in-, \ in \ and \ flare, \ to \ blow$

What you think it means as a whole: To blow in/up

9. Example Sentence: In a famous proclamation, Abraham Lincoln emancipated the slaves.

Component(s) and meaning(s): e(x), out of, manus, hand and capere, to take

What you think it means as a whole: To take out of someone's power, to liberate

10. Example Sentence: In the 1930s popular music was not rap or R&B but jazz and swing!

Component(s) and meaning(s): populus, people

What you think it means as a whole: For the general public

11. Example Sentence: In the 1990s and early 2000s, Microsoft was accused of having a <u>monopoly</u> over internet browsers.

Component(s) and meaning(s): Mono, one and polein, to sell

What you think it means as a whole: Sole control over one commodity

12. Example Sentence: In the ancient world there were no intellectual fields, like math and science, but nowadays people tend to <u>specialize</u> in one area.

Component(s) and meaning(s): species, appearence

What you think it means as a whole: A unique appearence, one of a kind.

13. Example Sentence: Fans of all types attend conventions like Comicon.

Component(s) and meaning(s): conventio, coming together

What you think it means as a whole: A coming together, a gathering

14. Example Sentence: The criminal, who has been on the run for years, was finally apprehended.

Component(s) and meaning(s): prehendere, to seize

What you think it means as a whole: To seize or grasp something or someone

15. Example Sentence: Some students find the memorizing of dozens of new roots and bases otiose.

Component(s) and meaning(s): otium, leisure time

What you think it means as a whole: boring

16. Example Sentence: Virgil spent 10 years writing the *Aeneid*, but on his death bed decreed that it should never be published.

Component(s) and meaning(s): populus/publicanus

What you think it means as a whole: made available to the general population

17. Example Sentence: One of the most exciting times to be a classicist is when a new <u>manuscript</u> is discovered.

Component(s) and meaning(s): manus, hand and script, something written

What you think it means as a whole: Something written by hand

18. Example Sentence: It is important to take your car in every few years to have it serviced.

Component(s) and meaning(s): servus, slave

What you think it means as a whole: an act of serving, assistance

19. Example Sentence: Our lives are made so much easier by modern technology.

Component(s) and meaning(s): techne, art, skill and logy, study of What you think it means as a whole: The study of an art or skill

20. Example Sentence: The bodies of cars are almost always made of some sort of <u>metal</u>, be it aluminum or steel.

Component(s) and meaning(s): metallon, mine (for metals)

What you think it means as a whole: Having to do with, or coming from a mine

21. Example Sentence: Many pieces of heavy equipment use <u>hydraulic</u> power to lift or move heavy objects.

Component(s) and meaning(s): hydr, water and aulos, pipe

What you think it means as a whole: Pipes of water used to transmit power

22. Example Sentence: The Latin <u>vernacular</u> eventually evolved into the modern languages of Spanish, French, Italian and Portuguese.

Component(s) and meaning(s): verna, slave, commoner

What you think it means as a whole: The common, colloquial language

23. Example Sentence: My friend Octavian just loves animals; he wants to be a veterinarian!

Component(s) and meaning(s): anima, soul, spirit

What you think it means as a whole: A living creature, something with an anima

24. Example Sentence: Some historians, both ancient and modern, accuse Augustus of being a power-hungry, egocentric person.

Component(s) and meaning(s): ego, I/self and centr, pertaining to a center

What you think it means as a whole: Adj. describing someone who is self-centered, selfish

25. Example Sentence: Bulimia is an example of an eating disorder.

Component(s) and meaning(s): bous, cow/ox and limos, hunger

What you think it means as a whole: An eating disorder involving over-eating

26. Example Sentence: Many people will go to great lengths to avoid spiders; <u>arachnophobia</u> is one of the more common phobias.

Component(s) and meaning(s): arachne, spider and phobia, irrational fear of

What you think it means as a whole: An irrational fear of spiders

27. Example Sentence: Octavia avoids going outside at all cost. Instead, she spends almost all her time inside her house; she has <u>agoraphobia!</u>

Component(s) and meaning(s): agora, marketplace and phobia, irrational fear of

What you think it means as a whole: Irrational fear of open or crowded spaces

28. Example Sentence: Some people are born swimmers and seem the happiest out in the water as thalassophiles.

Component(s) and meaning(s): thalassa, sea/ocean and phile, lover of

What you think it means as a whole: A lover of the sea or ocean.
